Brief summary of the content of the workshop	<p>The Action Research Communities for Language Teachers workshop was held at the ECML in Graz on the 10th and 11th of November, 2016 with 31 participants from the ECML countries.</p> <p>The workshop offered participants the opportunity to explore action research and its relationship to professional development. Discussions on action research as a way to enhance quality in education were opened through a number of activities. Participants had an opportunity to share their experiences on action research. There was input on distance language learning. During the course of the workshop participants identified possibilities for small action research projects and partners. The results of the workshop are mini-action research projects that are currently being developed across the ECML countries with final reports expected for the spring.</p>
What did you find particularly useful?	<p>I found particularly useful the opportunity to have a space to consider possible action research projects and to formulate them. It was also interesting to see the presentations from colleagues from other countries. I also found Jim Murphy's presentation very useful as at present I am researching the possibility of introducing online language learning in Ireland as a means of diversify the languages taught and to support heritage languages.</p> <p>I also enjoyed the different activities we engaged in in the course of the 2 days of the workshop. They were very well planned and illustrated the points being made in a very appropriate way. .</p>
How will you use what you learnt / developed in the event in your professional context?	<p>I am more aware now of the importance of engaging on action research on an ongoing basis. I will also encourage the MFL teachers I work with to carry out action research and to create a small community of practice with colleagues.</p>

It also allows participants to reflect on their understanding of action research and discover new approaches and prospects in the area. It encourages participants to create collaborative networks with practitioners in other countries to carry out joint action research projects.</p> <p>The project is of great interest and benefit to language teachers as it encourages them to carry out action research with a view to examine and progress in their own practice while being part of a community of practice. The resources provided act as a guide in this process.</p> <p>In this course of the 2 day workshop participants identify research action projects and partners across the ECML members. Following the workshop participants carry out and report on the mini-action-research project. The final report and results on the mini-action-research project will be circulated to the Action Research Project Team and may feed into the project’s guide and published on the project website.</p>
