Led by **Do Coyle** (University of Aberdeen, UK), **Fred Taveau** and **Dunja Chamberlain** (International School of Geneva, Switzerland).

This workshop will draw on the five classroom principles for developing a Pluriliteracies approach to Teaching for Learning (PTL) based on recent work from the Graz Group. Using successful innovations in classroom practices over several years at EcoLint, Fred Taveau will share some of his CLIL units and how a completely new approach to language teaching enabled beginner students to access a more advanced content and be more stimulated. Dunja Chamberlain will share her findings on her assessment of language progression when Science is taught through the medium of L2 and will give tips to adapt classroom practices to ensure greater progress and success.

Participants will be encouraged to apply the ideas to their own classrooms and plan their own tasks and activities applicable to their learners' needs.
