DeafSign workshop in Graz: Focus on sign language and inclusion

On May 15-16, 2025, I participated in an international workshop organized by the European Center for Modern Languages (ECML) as part of the DeafSign project – Unlocking educational opportunities in sign languages in Europe.

The aim of the project is to promote the learning and use of sign languages in Europe and to develop guidelines and resources for decision-makers and professionals in the education sector. Participants from 39 European countries met to work on three key themes.

The first theme was about deaf refugees and people from other ethnic backgrounds, with a focus on language learning and integration. It became clear that language barriers pose major challenges and that targeted support is needed.

The other two themes dealt with deaf children of hearing parents and children of deaf parents – in particular how communication works in the home. The participants will now gather experiences and data from their countries for the next meeting.

It was inspiring to work in international groups with both deaf and hearing professionals and skilled sign language interpreters. I am happy to be able to take this knowledge and experience back home to Denmark.
