Brief summary of the content of the workshop	During the workshop we explored the 5 principles of the “Graz Model”, which encourages deep learning by focusing teaching and learning on conceptualising facts, contents and procedures in age appropriate language
What did you find particularly useful?	I had never explored the CLIL methodology. This workshop helped me to articulate many ideas and concepts I myself believe in and practise intuitively in my classroom. I can now explain the thinking behind this methodology and the ideology it is based on.
How will you use what you learnt/ developed in the event in your professional context?	I hope to pilot this scheme over the next 12-24 months with a small number of subject and language teachers in my school. I hope to start with History and Home Economics and French language teachers.
How will you further contribute to the project?	I hope to work with Claire Matthews on rolling out this pilot project to more than one school. Hopefully through the expansion of this pilot project we can start courses/workshops for training subject and language teachers in Ireland in this methodology.

The recent ECML workshop in Graz entitled “Literacies through content and language integrated learning: effective learning across subjects and languages” was a two day workshop during which the participants were introduced to the 5 principles of the “Graz Model”, which encourages deep learning by focusing teaching and learning on conceptualising facts, contents and procedures in age appropriate language. It places a strong focus on teaching both language and content and with that encourages learners to become pluriliterate. When teaching through the target language teachers are more aware of explicitly teaching the subject specific language to their students as well as the content of their subject. By specifically teaching subject literacy deeper learning can and does happen. In order for teachers to become competent in teaching this model they should experience this type of learning first hand. During this workshop the group experts presented the ideology behind this model in short but very informative presentations before we explored the principles in groups. The way we were encouraged to learn during the workshop was based exactly on the ideology of the project. It illustrated how this methodology encourages deep understanding and as such was an invaluable learning experience. When used with target groups like teacher trainers, workshops like this should be replicated in the participants’ own country so teachers can benefit from the expertise and knowledge of the expert group through dissemination by the national participants. The ECML’s work is very valuable for language teachers in Europe and their professional development.
