Brief summary of the content of the workshop	<p>In the final « Language for Work » (LfW) network meeting the outcomes of the LfW-project were presented to professionals from over 30 countries. The main aim was to strengthen a European learning network to support different stakeholders (teachers, learners, policy makers etc.) in the field of language learning for work. The participants got the chance to share practice, experience, ideas and key issues for the development of language for work.</p> <p>The meeting also included expert inputs from Laurent Filliettaz, Université de Genève, on the very varied linguistic-communicative demands migrants typically encounter in today's workplace, and from Claire Extramiana about the Council of Europe's LIAM working group (Linguistic Integration of Adult Migrants).</p> <p>The last part of the workshop addressed the further development of the network, post-meeting actions and plans for collaborative work between network members.</p>

Language for Work - Developing migrants' language competences at work

Adäquate Sprachkenntnisse sind für das Berufsleben und die berufliche Entwicklung zentral. Das Erlernen der jeweiligen Mehrheitssprache für die Arbeit kann dabei auf formaler, non-formaler und informeller Ebene – meist direkt am Arbeitsplatz selbst – erfolgen. Dazu gibt es in Europa unterschiedliche Strategien, Ansätze und Lernangebote für MigrantInnen.

Ziel des Projekts “Language for Work” ist es, ein internationals Netzwerk an ExpertInnen in diesem Feld aufzubauen, Informationen über aktuelle Entwicklungen und Schwerpunkte in den einzelnen Ländern bereitzustellen, sowie erfolgversprechende Projekte und Materialien einer breiteren Öffentlichkeit zugänglich zu machen. Dadurch sollen insbesonders die berufliche Weiterentwicklung von SprachtrainerInnen unterstützt werden, aber auch Grundlagen für die Entwicklung von Sprachförderprogrammen auf lokaler und nationaler Ebene geliefert werden.
