#### 1. Public information

This was the fourth time that I participated in the PluriMobil project and needless to say I found this workshop held at the ECML in Graz from the 5<sup>th</sup> till the 7<sup>th</sup> of February 2014 most informative and resourceful.

First of all it is important to be aware of the European Centre for Modern Languages (ECML) which is situated in Graz, Austria and its multitude of tools, publications and resources which could be accessed on: <a href="http://www.ecml.at/">http://www.ecml.at/</a>. Language Teachers can participate in or else give their proposal to organize a project at this Centre. On-line resources to be used with learners are also available as well as related publications.

The PluriMobil project focuses on two main competences: plurilingual and intercultural. It aims at helping educators, be they teachers or student teachers to give an educational structure to mobility programmes. This structure is actually made up of lesson plans which are being proposed and devised for different levels: primary, lower secondary, upper secondary and vocational. These lesson plans can be viewed on: http://plurimobil.ecml.at/. Educators are thus encouraged to organize mobility programmes using the proposed stages of Before, During and After the mobility to help learners enhance their linguistic and cultural competences. The proposed lesson plans are well devised and easy to follow. They also include tools to be used such as AIE (Autobiography of Intercultural Encounters), ELP (European Language Portfolio), Mirrors and Windows and FREPA (A Framework of Reference for Pluralistic Approaches).

I am currently piloting the proposed tools and approach to mobility programmes and this could also be viewed on the PluriMobil website.
